1. Planned Shutdown in February 2022 for Rinconada Water Treatment Plant

The Rinconada Water Treatment Plant is scheduled to be shut down for seven (7) days, from Monday, February 7 to Monday, February 14, 2022, to facilitate underground piping work for the Residuals Remediation Project. Valley Water will also take this opportunity to perform other critical plant and pipeline maintenance activities. Performing these maintenance activities on a regular basis is essential to ensure that the plant's critical systems are reliable and remain in good working order. Barring any unforeseen circumstances, plant start up is scheduled for the morning of February 14, 2022.

Weeks of January 7 – January 20, 2022

West Pipeline retailers impacted by the upcoming outage are California Water Service Company, San Jose Water Company, and the cities of Santa Clara, Mountain View, and Sunnyvale. The impacted retailers will use their groundwater and/or alternate supplies to meet demands during the plant shutdown. Customers may notice a change in water characteristics and pressure during the shutdown. The shutdown schedule has been communicated to the retailers and Valley Water will continue to send periodic updates and reminders.

2. Safe, Clean Water Mini-Grant Closeout: Keep Coyote Creek Beautiful's Empire Gardens Elementary School Mural Project

In Fiscal Year 2021, Valley Water awarded Keep Coyote Creek Beautiful a \$5,000 Safe, Clean Water Program D3 Mini-Grant for their Empire Gardens Elementary School Mural Project. Keep Coyote Creek Beautiful completed the Project on October 8, 2021 and submitted the final invoice items on December 3, 2021, allowing for grant closeout.

Keep Coyote Creek Beautiful (KCCB) is a non-profit organization that works with community groups, public agencies, and students to reclaim, restore, and beautify Coyote Creek. This minigrant provided funding to support the installation of a mural on the campus of Empire Gardens Elementary School in San Jose, California. The Coyote Creek Watershed mural was designed by muralist Paul J. Gonzalez in collaboration with KCCB. This mural features elements of the creek ecosystem and educates students, teachers, and visitors about the natural wonders of Coyote Creek that runs alongside the school. As part of the project, KCCB hosted a nature walk on September 4, 2021 that was attended by Valley Water Director Barbara Keegan. KCCB also hosted a creek cleanup at Watson Park to allow the community to directly observe the nature elements and concepts included in the mural (watershed, wildlife, ecosystem). The newly painted mural serves as a reminder to the students about their direct impact on keeping the wildlife healthy by reducing litter, deterring graffiti, and participating in creek cleanups.

Key Outcomes:

- Installed one mural spanning 120 feet long by 10 feet high, which features animals, plants, and other wildlife present in the Coyote Creek Watershed.
- Hosted a nature walk with 11 attendees who participated in litter cleanup resulting in 5 bags of trash.
- Conducted 12 classroom presentations to introduce the project and to solicit ideas from students for mural content.
- Utilized social media to engage the community in the project, including 27 Facebook posts, 14 Instagram posts, 14 Twitter posts, 5 LinkedIn posts, and a YouTube video (https://youtu.be/-9Nok OUmd0).
- Students surveyed on their takeaways commented that Coyote Creek is a "habitat for animals, fish, coyotes, butterflies, bees, racoons, woodpeckers, blue jays, and rabbits."

3. Safe, Clean Water Mini-Grant Closeout: President and Board of Trustees of Santa Clara College's The Water Project

In Fiscal Year 2021, Valley Water awarded the President and Board of Trustees of Santa Clara College (Grantee) a \$5,000 Safe, Clean Water Program D3 Restore Wildlife Habitat Mini-Grant for their grant project called The Water Project. The Grantee completed the Project on October 31, 2021 and submitted the final invoice items on December 17, 2021, allowing for grant closeout.

The President and Board of Trustees of Santa Clara College is a board that governs Santa Clara University operations. The mini-grant provided funding for a multi-media performance hosted by the Grantee with a mission to raise awareness and promote engagement surrounding modern-day water issues. The performance featured an integration of dance, choral music, animation, projected imagery and live text to celebrate and study society's cultural relationship to water. The Water Project aimed to educate the public and motivate action to be engaged with 21st century water issues, such as drought, aquifer depletion and large agriculture water use.

Three live performances were presented at Mayer Theatre on the Santa Clara University campus from October 1-3, 2021. The performances engaged a total of 427 attendees and the Grantee reported 11 feedback response surveys that highlighted how the performance compelled its audience to critically consider their relationship with water.

The Water Project was also compiled into a video that was made available to stream on October 8, 2021(https://tinyurl.com/3ybytwkr). A documentary film of the creative process behind The Water Project is expected to be complete in March 2022.

Key Outcomes:

- Engaged a total of 427 attendees from all three live performances.
 - o 220 attendees on Friday, October 1, 2021.
 - 105 attendees on Saturday, October 2, 2021.
 - o 102 attendees on Sunday, October 3, 2021.
- Reached 336 online views on the Water Project's video stream as of January 11, 2022.
- Received 11 responses from the post-event surveys which indicated that the performance engaged them to consider their relationship with water and issues surrounding water.

4. Sunnyvale Shoreline Resilience Vision

In 2019, Valley Water and Google engaged the San Francisco Estuary Institute to develop a visioning document for the Sunnyvale shoreline area, called the Sunnyvale Shoreline Resilience Vision ("Vision"). The Vision group was formed, consisting of landowners and land managers along the San Francisco Bay shoreline from Stevens Creek to San Tomas Aquino Creek, to facilitate information sharing and identify ways to collaboratively address shared goals and challenges, including climate change adaptation. Key stakeholders include Valley Water, City of Sunnyvale, Google, Lockheed Martin, Midpeninsula Regional Open Space District, National Aeronautics and Space Administration, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, and the South Bay Salt Pond Restoration Project. The Vision group convened around the shared goals of climate resilience, ecological restoration, increasing access to the Bay, and reducing risk and enhancing quality of life for workers and residents along the shoreline.

Weeks of January 7 – January 20, 2022

Between 2019 and 2021, the Vision group explored synergies between individual planning efforts to help coordinate actions towards shared objectives. The group came up with opportunities such as streamlining and improving the aging stormwater management system, enhancing ecological function and biodiversity in both the urban area and baylands, and developing a subregional shoreline adaptation approach.

Engagement in this Vision group has also provided an opportunity for all stakeholders to learn about the South San Francisco Bay Shoreline Feasibility Study, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) planning process, and how preparatory actions now can assist the USACE when Phase III of the South San Francisco Bay Shoreline Feasibility Study is initiated. The South San Francisco Bay Shoreline Phase III Feasibility Study's start is dependent on the receipt of federal funds.

Stakeholders are committed to continuing this collaboration and plan to stay closely coordinated around the anticipated South San Francisco Bay Shoreline Phase III Feasibility Study once funding is made available. 5. Two Day Shutdown Planned in January 2022 for the Silicon Valley Advanced Water Purification Center

On January 20, 2022, the Silicon Valley Advanced Water Purification Center (SVAWPC) is planned to be shut down for two (2) days to perform critical repairs that were identified during the biennial electrical systems testing in December 2021.

During the shutdown, the quality of the water received by South Bay Water Recycling customers will change as purified water from the SVAWPC will not be available for blending. The SVAWPC is scheduled to return to service by the end of day on January 21, 2022.

6. Valley Water Hosts Pacheco Reservoir Expansion Project Draft Environmental Impact Report Virtual Public Meeting

On January 13, 2022, Valley Water hosted a virtual public meeting on the Pacheco Reservoir Expansion Project Draft Environmental Impact Report (EIR). Valley Water Board Members Chair Kremen, Vice Chair Varela and Director Santos attended the meeting and provided welcoming remarks. Director Hsueh also attended the virtual meeting. A combined total of 64 people participated in the virtual event through Zoom and Facebook Live.

The presentation provided an overview of the six project alternatives studied in the draft EIR, including a no project alternative. During the meeting, Valley Water responded to more than 20 inquiries related to the draft EIR. Participants were reminded that all comments regarding the document must be written and submitted by February 15, 2022.

7. Valley Water Submits Two-Year Mercury Progress Report to San Francisco Bay Regional Board

On January 3, 2022, Valley Water submitted the 2020-2021 Progress Report on Methylmercury Control Measures in Reservoirs to the San Francisco Bay Regional Water Quality Control Board (Regional Board). Valley Water reports to the Regional Board every two years as part of its voluntary participation in the Guadalupe River Watershed Mercury Total Maximum Daily Load Program.

Fish in Guadalupe River Watershed water bodies are impacted by mercury from the historic New Almaden Mining District. Eating contaminated fish can have neurotoxic and reproductive effects on people and wildlife. Valley Water operates treatment systems in four reservoirs and Almaden Lake to attain regulatory targets for mercury in fish. These treatment systems are intended to prevent low-oxygen conditions from developing in bottom waters. This approach should decrease the amount of mercury available to the food chain. Valley Water monitors mercury in water and fish to evaluate the systems' effectiveness, reporting progress to the Regional Board every two years.

Mercury in fish is declining in Almaden, Guadalupe, and Stevens Creek reservoirs, although concentrations remain above regulatory targets. An unintended side effect of the treatment systems was warming of reservoir outflow. Valley Water is working with university researchers and the Regional Board to develop effective methods for mercury control that improve water quality. In addition to providing valuable information about mercury control strategies, Valley Water's studies have provided hands-on research experience to numerous student interns from local universities.

Director Santos requested Valley Water send communications to creek owners, including cities, County, school districts and private property owners to clarify a property owners' responsibilities for managing the portion(s) of the creek on their property. This response will be included in the January 21, 2022 Non-Agenda Packet.

A letter, or other form of communication, will be sent to creekside property owners informing and reminding them that they have certain responsibilities to manage their lands. This communication will be sent this summer in preparation for the following winter storm season since property owners should not be encouraged to manage creek lands during the current winter season's high flow events and salmonid migration season. The communication includes two fact sheets that clarify stream maintenance responsibilities of both Valley Water and property owners and the beneficial aspects of large woody debris within creeks.

Describe how the incident or loss happened, and the reason you believe the Santa Clara Valley Water District is responsible for your damages (*Please attach additional sheets if necessary*):

The damaged to the traffic loops was caused by the street sweeper that was hired by SCVWD to maintain dust and debris control at Great Mall Parkway. The highest concentration of track-out from the off hauling operation was at the exit of the driveway which puts it right at the traffic signal loops. I witnessed several times the sweepers crawling or sitting stationary directly on top of the traffic loops with the brushes in operation. On the date of 10/19/2021 at 11:00 A.M. I noticed that the traffic loops were severed at the #3 lane right after the sweeper made its pass. I also saw part of the traffic loop tangled into the sweeper's rear brushes. I reported the incident to Stephen King the foreman for SCVWD and he acknowledged that there was damage to the loops and he informed me that the incident will get reported to his supervisor. I also called out Matt Garcia from the City of Milpitas streets division to verify that the traffic loops were damaged and the signal equipment was in "default mode".



Describe how the incident or loss happened, and the reason you believe the Santa Clara Valley Water District is responsible for your damages:

Our house is located with backyard next to Regnart Creek. The current chain link fence of Valley Water is in between our backyard and the Regnart Creek. There was no wood fence when we purchased this property and moved in June, 1994. We were not notified that the chain link fence is not on our property line during the proposal and discussion of Regnart Creek Trail project. We were never being notified that the chain link fence needs to be moved to property line till late last year. This piece of important information was never disclosed to the property owners at the time the Regnart Creek Trail project was started and reviewed. Once the project approved, we chose not to participate fence replacement and we like to keep the existing chain link fencing as is.

We contacted Valley Water before we finally removed Italian Stone Pine tree in our backyard in 2014 as half of the brunches reached to the creek. A clerk from the VW came for a site visit and we were told the tree is in our backyard and we as property owner has to take care of it.

If the existing chain link fence will be relocated, our investment to the newly completed backyard (was done between Nov 2020 - Feb 2021) and all services done for a huge Stone Pine tree, other tree on the VW land, and bushes/ivyes (we never planted) on the chain link in the past 28 years will be on our losses.

- 1. Landscape damage: Part of the plants and 3 ginkgo trees will be replants or relocated.
 - a. plants: ~ 40 plants 40x\$10 = \$400

SUBJECT: BMR-R-21-0007 **DATE**: 1/14/2022

Through BMR R-21-0007 Director Santos requested staff send communications to creek owners, including cities, County, school districts and private property owners to clarify a property owners' responsibilities for managing the portion(s) of the creek on their property. This response will be included in the January 21, 2022 Non-Agenda Packet.

A letter, or other form of communication, will be sent to property owners informing and reminding them that as a creekside property owner they have responsibilities to manage their lands. Staff intends to send this communication this summer in preparation for the winter storm season since property owners should not be encouraged to manage creek lands during this season's high flow events and salmonid migration season.

Enclosed are two fact sheets, that includes information, which will be included in the communication. The fact sheets describe stream maintenance responsibilities of both Valley Water and property owners and the beneficial aspects of large woody debris within creeks.

Fact Sheet

Stream Maintenance



Stream Maintenance by Valley Water

Valley Water performs stream maintenance on completed flood protection projects to keep them in a safe and usable condition as originally designed and constructed. As the landowner, Valley Water also manages its property by performing work along streams.

Maintenance of Capital Projects

Capital projects are large-scale projects that maintain or improve capital assets. They involve a planning, design and approval process that includes public review, California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) compliance, funding, and land and regulatory permit acquisition. Valley Water maintains the structural and functional integrity of these constructed projects to ensure the significant investment in infrastructure continues to provide the flood protection benefits as its intended design and construction.

Maintenance activities for Capital Projects









* Erosion is a natural process; Valley Water is not obligated to keep a creek "in place". Rather, Valley Water is obligated (considering the availability of resources) to preserve the functional and structural integrity of flood protection projects built or accepted by Valley Water.

Activities include removal of sediment and other obstructions to flow, erosion repair, and vegetation management. Work activities are defined and permitted under a Stream Maintenance Program (SMP), a ten-year program approved in 2013 by seven state and federal regulatory agencies.

Maintenance work is prioritized based on several considerations, including available resources. Higher priority is given to capital projects completed with federal partners, levee maintenance, and work to preserve channel capacity.

Maintenance as a Landowner

Valley Water performs work on properties owned in fee title or where otherwise obligated by permit or agreement. These activities include weed abatement, hazardous tree removal, pruning for access, care of planted mitigation sites, fence and erosion repair, and graffiti, trash, and debris removal.

Maintenance activities as a landowner



Maintenance on easements

Valley Water performs limited work on properties owned by others where Valley Water has an easement. Easements are generally acquired for flood protection or water management and storm drainage purposes and grant rights (not obligations) to take actions in accordance with those purposes.

Valley Water does not perform activities such as weed abatement, erosion repair, graffiti or trash removal on easements as these are landowner responsibilities. Removal of fallen trees or other obstructions to flow are flood protection activities that may be done by Valley Water. Unless otherwise stated, erosion repair on easements is a property owner responsibility.

The landowner retains rights to use the easement but cannot take actions, such as construction of a building, that conflict with the Valley Water easement right. A typical easement deed requires a property owner to seek Valley Water's approval for certain construction activities such as grading and fencing.

Property Owner's Responsibility for Creek Maintenance

Every property owner has a duty to maintain his or her property in a reasonably safe condition that does not interfere with a neighbor's ability to enjoy their property. A property owner is not required to enlarge or increase the capacity of a creek for flood protection purposes. Maintenance duties may include vegetation management, erosion repair, and removal of graffiti, trash, debris, and fallen trees. Some activities are subject to permitting by local, state and federal regulatory agencies prior to performing the work.

Exceptions and Joint Efforts

There are limited situations where Valley Water may conduct work on private or other public agency owned property. Work may be conducted, subject to agreements, on other public agency owned property or on private property, with permission, during emergencies or for limited stream stewardship purposes.

Emergency Work

Valley Water may perform urgent and emergency flood protection work on other public or private property where a public purpose is endangered, subject to written permission to enter from the property owner. Staff availability and priorities will likely limit our response in an urgent or emergency situation.

Stream Stewardship

Stream stewardship activities that remove invasive plants along streams are conducted by Valley Water staff. This work may occur on Valley Water property and easements with permission from the property owner. Because it is important to eradicate invasive plants along a creek on a watershed and watershed wide basis and the Safe Clean Water Program provides funding for this activity, staff may also seek permission to perform this work on private property.

Fallen Tree or Large Woody Debris?

Many creeks and rivers throughout Santa Clara County are lined with large trees. These trees may die, break, or fall over due to erosion or storms and enter the stream channel. Some trees may be removed and some become large woody debris. Large woody debris (LWD) can be an entire tree, a stump or just a large branch that has fallen into the creek. But how big must a branch or tree be to be considered large woody debris? At Valley Water, the Stream Maintenance Program (SMP) classifies LWD as a piece of woody material with a diameter of 12 inches or more and a minimum length of 6 feet. This classification applies to fallen trees located in streams that support sensitive fish species including many major streams and tributaries in Santa Clara County. This definition was adapted from the California Salmonid Stream Restoration Manual created by the California Department of Fish and Wildlife. Woody material that size or larger generally has the most effect (ecologically and hydraulically) on rivers and creeks.

How is Large Woody Debris Beneficial?

LWD promotes a complex and diverse aquatic habitat within creeks in the following ways:

- Provides escape cover for juvenile and adult fish from predators and high winter flows.
- Traps organic material providing food areas for insects to reproduce, which in turn provides food for fish and other aquatic organisms.
- Traps gravels, providing areas for fish and insects to reproduce and feed.
- Maintains and creates complex channel features like pools, riffles and runs through energy dissipation and scour.

All of these are essential natural components created by LWD, which provide habitat for sensitive species such as Steelhead trout, California Red Legged Frog, and Western Pond Turtle.

Large Woody Debris and Valley Water

Although a common inclination would be to remove the fallen tree from the stream, Valley Water strives to promote a balance between flood protection and environmental protection. Whenever possible, LWD is left and maintained in place. However, LWD can cause harm such as unwanted erosion of flood protection infrastructure or debris jams in vulnerable areas. When LWD is identified, qualified staff, including engineers and biologists, assess the wood for its habitat value. If there is potential to cause harm, Valley Water attempts to modify the LWD by removing branches or repositioning the wood in the channel. If modification cannot alleviate the threat, then complete removal may be necessary. Under the SMP, removal of LWD requires mitigation to offset the loss of habitat provided by the LWD. Mitigation comprises the replacement of the LWD in kind within the same watershed. Removal is generally the last approach taken due to the loss of habitat on site.

When possible, Valley Water incorporates LWD in bank stabilization projects. Several projects throughout the county have included the installation of LWD structures to replenish woody debris and to increase habitat complexity in areas that will provide the most ecological benefit.

Valley Water's right-of-way defined

This sheet provides information about Valley Water's treatment of LWD on Valley Water's property and easements. Valley Water's right-of-way includes:

- Property owned by Valley Water in fee title which is managed with available resources consistent with federal, state and local laws and ordinances;
- Property where Valley Water has an exclusionary easement, meaning that the underlying fee property owner is effectively excluded from actively using the property; and
- Property where Valley Water has an easement for flood protection, storm drainage or water conservation purposes.
