Barrier Removal

Project Summary

The new Singleton Bridge is now open to the public. The former Singleton Road crossing, a set of culverts installed in the late 1800s, blocked fish passage for over 120 years. In recent years, the road has been used as the Coyote Creek Bike and Pedestrian Trail. In fall 2021, the road was replaced with a bridge constructed out of recycled rail cars. Thanks to the collaborative efforts of the City of San Jose and Valley Water, pedestrians and cyclists now have increased safety crossing the creek, and wildlife including Steelhead, have improved access to an additional 17 miles of upstream habitat.

Through Valley Water's Safe, Clean Water and Natural Flood Protection Program, the City of San Jose received \$1 million to complete the bridge and habitat restoration project. The Safe, Clean Water Program provides approximately \$47 million annually for local projects to deliver safe, clean water, natural flood protection, and environmental stewardship to all the communities Valley Water serves in Santa Clara County.

The Singleton bridge project is a great example of multi-agency teamwork to complete a project that benefits trail users, enhances security access to protect the public, and removes a significant fish passage barrier for Steelhead, a threatened species under the Endangered Species Act. The City of San Jose and Valley Water worked carefully together to complete this project with input from State and Federal Environmental Permitting Agencies. Valley Water staff are proud to have contributed to the hydraulic design, environmental permitting, and funding for this project, and we thank the City of San Jose for administering construction of the project.
